

Portland's closest internationally acclaimed wine country just got even better! With bragging rights for new awardwinning breweries and eateries, there's every reason to stay and play in the Tualatin Valley. Discover quaint small town main streets, picturesque farm markets chock full of fresh juicy berries and produce, rail-to-trail bike paths, and homegrown American baseball–with tickets that won't break the bank–all located minutes from downtown Portland and centrally located between Mt. Hood and the Oregon Coast. It's the ideal base for hub-and-spoke itineraries.

Comfortable Accommodations

Tualatin Valley's 30+ wineries are nestled in the hills of the northern Willamette Valley wine region, just west of Portland. The European Union recently designated the Willamette Valley with "Protected Geographical Indication" status, recognizing the wines for their quality. In the US, only Napa Valley and the Willamette Valley bear this distinction.

Don't know where to start to discover each of Tualatin Valley's many wineries? Here are a few suggestions (see map on page 2 for general locations; please note that many wineries require reservations in advance).

Near the northern portion of the Vineyard & Valley Scenic Tour Route:

Abbey Creek Winery, where "Hip Hop, Wine & Chill", is the anthem of the first Black-owned winery in Oregon and produces a diverse variety of wines, such as tasty Malbecs, Chardonnay, Pinot Noir and more.

Apolloni Vineyards, shares their Italian-styled wines in an intimate setting near the crest of a hill. The family's link to Tuscan winemaking culture is apparent and celebrated.

David Hill Winery, one of Oregon's oldest vineyards, offers wine tasting in its 1883 farmhouse, where the wines are as superb as the views! During warmer months, guests can take a self-guided vineyard hike.

Near the southern portion of the Vineyard & Valley Scenic Tour Route:

Alloro Vineyard, believes that staying close to the earth is staying close to the riches of life. This family-owned winery harkens to their Croatian and Italian roots.

Raptor Ridge, produces quality Pinot Noir, Pinot Gris and rare varieties not commonly grown locally. Founded in 1995, their tasting room deck offers 180-degree views of the rolling vineyards.

Comfortable Accommodations

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Tualatin Valley Local Favorites

Discover some cherished off-the-beaten-path treasures:

Helvetia Tavern is an iconic pub that hails from 1946 and is known for its burgers, pool table, and baseball caps covering the ceiling.

McMenamins' Cornelius Pass Roadhouse is an I850s repurposed farm offering good food, craft brews and spirits from the on-site brewery and distillery, with plenty of outdoor seating.

The Rice NW Museum of Rocks & Minerals, a Smithsonian affiliate, houses a world-class collection of fossils, meteorites, rocks, minerals and more.

SakéOne is the leading craft brewer of saké in the US, and welcomes guests to their tasting room in Forest Grove.

Smith Berry Barn is a local farm and garden with berries, apples and pears, oh, my! Ice cream and souvenirs, too.

South Store Café, located across the street from Smith Berry Barn, is a quaint gathering place offering fresh pastries, sandwiches, soups, salads, and espresso bar.

Tualatin Valley's Charming Downtowns

These small, quaint downtowns are thriving and walkable, offering a variety of culinary delights:


Beaverton's Restaurant Row is a collection of dining and beverage establishments within an easy walk of each other. Local favorites include Big's Chicken (some of the best fried chicken ever), Top Burmese Bistro Royale (Burmese cuisine served by robots), Afuru Izakaya (Japanese deliciousness), ExNovo Brewpub (non-profit brewery featuring Detroitstyle pizza), and Loyal Legion (with 82 Oregon beer taps), and many more local restaurants.

Hillsboro's Main Street features an abundance of cuisine including Amelia's Exquisite Mexican Dining, fine dining at Venetian Hillsboro, and local coffee house Insomnia. Just a short walk from Main Street is Japanese restaurant Syun Izakaya, which draws guests from near and far, feeling more "Hokkaido than Hillsboro."

Forest Grove is a classic American small town, and home to Pacific University and its tree-lined campus. Four favorite places to dine/ drink are **Ridgewalker Brewing** (35 local beer taps, boasting the "best burgers" in town), **Urban Decanter** (wine bar), **Bites** (Asian fusion small bites), **Biscuitology** (breakfast and lunch), and **Diversity Café** (live music on weekends).
